Vernacular Buildings in the Long Eighteenth Century

The theme of the 2018 Winter Conference is the vernacular architecture of the 'long eighteenth century'. The period between the mid-seventeenth century and the early nineteenth century is apt to be represented by vernacularists as spelling the gradual extinction of a living vernacular tradition. The resulting neglect of the period, particularly in England, has prevented us from developing the increasingly textured and resilient understanding that we have come to take for granted in earlier periods. More than twenty years after Georgian Vernacular (1996), the outcome of a joint VAG and Georgian Group symposium, this conference will re-examine the period in the light of recent regional, national and transatlantic research. It will explore the barometer of change over the course of this long but far from changeless period, including the persistence of vernacular forms and practices within the wider building culture, the tension between tradition and innovation in materials and design, the social choices manifested through the appropriation of polite forms to everyday buildings, and the emergence, by the end of the period, of a tentative understanding of vernacular architecture as regionally diverse and culturally significant.

Our venue used until 2016 is no longer available because, as elsewhere, Leicester students demand all-year round availability of accommodation. So last year we switched to College Court, which has purpose-built conference suites and accommodation within the same building - 4* hotel standard rather than student accommodation - with en-suite single rooms and twin-bedded rooms available (at no additional cost). College Court is situated in the Knighton area of Leicester, within two acres of landscaped gardens and is a little closer to the Railway Station than the Conference Centre previously used. Ample car parking is available adjacent to College Court. The Conference fee for 2018 is unaltered from 2017 and reflects the superior facilities and accommodation that we shall be using.

The Conference Venue

This year's Winter Conference will be held in Leicester for the twelfth consecutive year, at the College Court Conference Centre which proved to be generally satisfactory in January this year. All accommodation is in single rooms with en-suite facilities and a double bed; couples will therefore need to decide whether they would prefer one room or two (and indicate on the Booking Form accordingly), although it would be helpful if they could use just one room to enable maximum use of the accommodation.

Accommodation is also available for visitors with disabilities. All facilities, including the conference suite & dining room are within the same building.

A room adjacent to the Conference Hall will be set aside for the display and sale of members' literature, in the usual way. A bar will be open after dinner on Saturday evening.

Vegetarian, or other dietary needs, can be met by the catering staff.

Leicester: How to get there

The City of Leicester is more or less central to England and Wales and is well served by motorways, rail services and airports (Birmingham, East Midlands and Manchester).

A location map for Leicester appears on the back page of this leaflet.

Members will be sent on request (see Booking Form) a leaflet giving travel directions to College Court from the M1/M69, the A6 and from the A47. This leaflet also provides a more detailed map, showing the location of College Court in the Knighton district of Leicester: postcode LE2 3TQ.

Leicester is well served by rail, with direct lines from London – St. Pancras (1hr.10min), Birmingham (55min), Sheffield (1hr.), and Lincoln (1hr.50min); from Leeds (2hrs.) change at Derby/Sheffield. From Leicester train station, **Bus Routes 44 and 44A** (every 15 minutes on Saturdays) take you to the Conference Centre, ask for the bus stop at the end of Queens Road, opposite the front of College Court.

A taxi from the station (1.4 miles) will cost about £6.

On arrival, report to Reception.

If arriving by car, park in the Car Park (or the Overflow Car Park if so directed), proceed to Reception from where **room keys will be issued between 13.00 and 13.50 hours** (subject to your room having been cleaned, etc.) and then take your luggage to your room. If you do not have sufficient time to check in before the start of the conference, leave your luggage in your car until later.

VAG Name Badges will be issed in the conference room, on the first floor.

Please note that no refreshments can be purchased at College Court (or nearby) & note that room keys will not be available before 13.00 hours.

The conference Programme will commence promptly at 14.00 hours.
